There is also an increased chance of mental retardation in children who have Cerebral Palsy.

Even though there are certain controllable variables during early stages of pregnancy that can predict a possibility of cerebral palsy, most of the situations that may cause a child to develop this devastating and life-changing condition occur just before or during childbirth. Cerebral Palsy occurs between one and four children for every 1000 live births in the United States. In other words, 5,000 to 10,000 babies every year are stricken with this live-changing and debilitating condition. With a bittersweet debt due to medical advances, as of 2005 the number of cases of Cerebral Palsy have steadily risen in both quantity and severity of the condition - primarily due to the fact that many premature babies who would have died are now saved through advanced medical technology.
